

WHAT IS FINANCIAL AID?



Financial aid consists of funds provided to students and families to help pay for post-secondary educational expenses.

FINANCIAL AID MYTHS

- College is too expensive
- Only students with high financial need receive aid
- My parents make too much money
- The form is too hard to fill out
- The FAFSA is only for grants & scholarships
- The estimated family contribution number is the amount I will have to pay

AVOID FINANCIAL AID SCAMS



- Family
- Federal government
- States
- Colleges & universities
- Private sources
- Employers

TYPES OF FINANCIAL AID



LOANS

- Direct Subsidized & Unsubsidized
- Perkins
- PLUS (Parent Loan for Undergraduate Students)
- Private Loans

MUST BE PAID BACK

- Borrowed \$
- Low interest/no interest loans
- May need credit worthy cosigner

GRANTS

- Federal Pell Grants
- Federal Supplemental Education Opportunity Grants (FSEOG)
- State Grants
- Institutional Grants

- DO NOT have to be repaid
- Often called "gift aid"
- Usually based on need



SCHOLARSHIPS

Competitive

Awards based on:

- Merit or talent
- Financial need
- Interests/career plans
- Leadership/service

Non Institutional

Awards based on:

- Corporations
- Local, state or national organizations
- Civic groups, churches
- May be used at any school

Institutional

- Awarded on behalf of the college/university
- May only be used at that school

WORK-STUDY

- Type of federal financial aid
- DOES NOT have to be repaid
- Based on demonstrated need
- Student works at a job (often on campus), 10-15 hours per week
- Not all colleges participate

WHO CAN GET FEDERAL STUDENT AID?

Basic criteria:

- U.S. citizen or permanent resident
- High school graduate
- Eligible degree or certificate program
- Valid social security number
- Males registered for selective service
- Satisfactory academic progress while in college/career school

HOW MUCH STUDENT AID CAN I GET?

Depends on your financial need, determined by:

EFC (Estimated Family Contribution): comes from FAFSA

COA (Cost of Attendance): tuition, fees, room, board, transportation for that particular college

COA – EFC = Student Financial Need

EXPECTED FAMILY CONTRIBUTION (EFC) IS INFLUENCED BY THESE FACTORS:

- The amount the student's parents will be asked to pay from income and assets
- The amount the student can contribute from earnings and savings
- Family size, age of oldest parent, number of children currently attending college
- Special circumstances: Health related expenses, loss of property or death in the family

College Scorecard

Information on college costs, graduation, and postcollege earnings.

Deadlines

Information about your deadlines.

School Code Search

Find your college's school code. Also find detailed information about your college.

FAFSA Filing Options

Learn about the other options for filing your FAFSA.

WHAT IS THE FAFSA?

Free Application for Federal Student Aid

- Standard form that collects demographic and financial information about the student & family
- Used to determine financial need (EFC=Estimated Financial Contribution)
- Used to apply for federal & state student grants, work-student & loans

STEP 1: CREATE A FSA ID

What is the FSA ID?

www.fsaid.ed.gov

- Username & password
- Student AND Parent of dependent student will need an FSA ID to complete the FAFSA process.

What do you need to create your FSA ID?

- Your full name
- Your social security #
- Your date of birth


STEP 2: GATHER DOCUMENTS


- Your driver's license # (if you have one)
- Tax records from prior year
- Records of any untaxed income
- Your FSA ID (to sign your application electronically)
- List of colleges you are interested in attending
 - Your FAFSA information will be sent to these colleges
 - The college will work to put together a financial aid package for you based on your FAFSA information (EFC) and the COA

STEP 3: FILL IT OUT!

Click <u>www.fafsa.gov</u> to start a new FAFSA.

TIPS FOR COMPLETING THE FAFSA

- Apply early & meet all deadlines
- If parents are divorced, use parent with whom the student lives with the most
- Step-parent must be included
- If a student thinks he/she can answer 'yes' to a dependency status question, check with the financial aid administrator



STEP 4: EMAIL CONFIRMATION

- Check your email for your FAFSA confirmation
- Double check your information: make sure it is correct!
- If you used estimated numbers, and have completed your tax return, complete the IRS data retrieval in the FAFSA
- Correct any mistakes & resubmit the FAFSA
- Meet all deadlines or your could miss out on aid!

HOW IS FINANCIAL AID AWARDED?

- Colleges listed on the FAFSA will receive the electronic Student Aid Report (SAR).
- You can list up to 10 schools.
- Schools use the information on the SAR to prepare a financial aid package to help meet your financial need.
- A financial aid award letter is sent to the student
- Colleges may offer a combination of several types of financial aid
- Student must accept or reject financial aid offered
- Funds are awarded in the fall

NET PRICE CALCULATORS

Available on a college's website, net price calculators can help prospective students get a better handle on what they will be expected to pay.

Students enter information about their family's financial situation to learn what similar students paid to attend the institution in the previous year.

Knowing your net price:

- Gives you the best idea of what you'll pay for a particular college
- Makes comparing colleges easier
- Widens your choice of colleges


